BEAUTIFUL VOLUME OF BOTANY, by Jaume Saint-Hilaire, 98 fascinating stipple-engravings (plates n° 302-400). The illustrations are amazing, fresh and detailed. For each plant or flower there are 1-2 description pages and 1-3 full page illustrations, each illustration printed on high quality and bright paper. The engravings are detailed and with beautiful colours. All illustrations are protected by a tissue guard. "Exquisitely delicate plates of pure colour printing" (Dunthorne). Jean Henri Jaume Saint-Hilaire (1772-1845) is one of the lesser known members of a group of post-revolutionary botanists that had at its heart such luminaries as L'Heritiere, Ventenat, and most notably Pierre-Joseph Redouté.

Illustrator Jean-Henri Jaume (1772-1851) was a French naturalist and in Grasse, France. Born as Jaume, he added Saint-Hilaire later. He served in the French Army during the campaign, before returning to civilian life in 1800. He wrote a guide to the new Muséum National d'Histoire Naturelle - 1823 and resumed his studies, especially natural history.
